

SPRING IN EASTERN SPAIN: Plants and gardens in the province of Alicante

Sunday 15 April to Sunday 22 April 2018

Spring on Spain's Costa Blanca varies from year to year but this trip should catch gardens in their spring freshness before the heat builds up. Among other treats members will see wild flowers including orchids near Javea and have the opportunity to walk on the Montgó massif. They'll visit a Moorish-style garden cum museum, the renowned palm groves and Huerto del Cura garden of Elche, the exemplary Albarda gardens near Denia which mimic Renaissance gardens of Valencia and a variety of private gardens.



This will be a two-centre trip, staying the first nights in Elche and moving on to Denia. At left is a general view of the grounds of the Hotel Huerto del Cura, Elche, close to the famous gardens and palm museum.

An alternative hotel in Elche is the Jardin Milenio, a bit further from the centre but still within easy walking distance and also with pleasant grounds. Both the Hotel Huerto del Cura and the Hotel Jardin Milenio have four stars.

Another possibility in Elche is the three-star Hotel Tryp El Ciudad Elche, on a fairly busy street close to the centre of the city. It may be noisier than the two more luxurious hotels but is convenient for the centre and cheaper than the others.

While the group is based in Elche there will be visits to a botanical research station in the hills, to Carmen del Campillo (a Moroccan tea garden), a Spanish professor's "Roman" garden, and to the private garden and plant collection of Carol and Alan Hawes. Part of Carol and Alan's garden is divided into sections for different continents (Africa, America and Australia). Alan has recently built a shade house and loves eucalyptus trees, of which he has a collection.

The second half of the tour will be based in Denia at hotels on or near the attractive working port which supplies the nearby fish market and from which there are regular ferries to and from the Balearics.



La Posada del Mar (left) is one of the hotels the MPG group will use, and is located in central Denia. From Denia we will visit the typically Mediterranean Albarda Garden (below), owned by a private foundation which encourages conservation and the use of native species.



The programme is provisional. The outline below includes visits which may in the end be left out. On the other hand, new elements may be added and the order of events will change as plans develop. We need, however, to book hotel rooms, so please **apply for a place as soon as you can**. Offers of places will be made with – it is hoped – definite costs, and deposits of about £200 per person (or a euro amount to be advised) will be requested on about 15 August.

Sunday 15 April 2018	Arrival and welcome dinner
Next three days	Visits to two contrasting private gardens, a Moorish tea garden with fascinating plants, buildings and curios, a botanical research station in the foothills of the mountains behind Alicante with a renowned iris collection, the palm museum and palm groves of Elche and the town's beautiful Huerto del Cura garden and central squares. Lunches will be typically Spanish, one in the city, one in the countryside and one in a garden.
Final days based in Denia	We will spend a morning and have a light lunch at the Albarda Gardens which are stunning, with native plants and everything beautifully and imaginatively designed. It is surprising that these gardens are not better known. http://www.jardinalbarda.com/description/?lang=en There will be visits to private gardens, a cactus and succulent specialist, the garden of a small lavender farm and a local wild-plant enthusiast will give an illustrated lecture one evening before dinner and will guide the group to see wild flowers – particularly orchids – the following day. There may also be a longer optional walk led by a British retired professional gardener.

The cost of the trip is expected to be approximately £670 to £800 per person, with a supplement of about £235 for single occupancy of a double room. We'll try to match up single members who would like to share a twin room.

The fee for the trip will include transport during the tour, entrance fees, accommodation, guides and meals other than one dinner in Denia (giving members an evening to explore) and tea at Carmen del Campillo (where it is impracticable to pay as a group). Wine with meals is included occasionally. Flights and airport transfers are not included.

The more expensive hotels are the Hotel Huerto del Cura in Elche and La Posada del Mar in Denia. These have four stars. The slightly more economical hotels are the Hotel Jardin Milenio in Elche and El Raset in Denia.
